



2023 Voter Pulse Survey New Mexico Chamber of Commerce

New Mexicans are hopeful for change that will continue to move New Mexico forward, improve education, diversify the economy, decrease crime, and improve access to healthcare and affordable housing. A 2023 survey conducted by the New Mexico Chamber of Commerce and Strategies 360 highlights the changes that New Mexicans feel are necessary to move the state forward and how they would like to see the budget surplus used to support those changes. The Chamber is pleased that many of the priorities expressed in the poll match those of the New Mexico Chamber as well as those expressed by Governor Lujan Grisham during her State of the State message this year.

Budget Surplus Investment

New Mexicans clearly understand our budget surplus should be used to set our economy up for long-term success. The majority supporting long-term investments with the surplus, with improving public safety and public education as the top two priorities for the surplus.

How do New Mexicans feel the \$3.5 billion surplus should be spent?

- Invest in longer-term priorities to strengthen New Mexico for the future (55%)
- Invest in near-term priorities that provide immediate relief and benefits (27%)
- Save for a rainy day (13%)

Specifically, the voters believe the surplus spend should focus on:

- Reducing crime and increasing public safety (49%)
- Improving Education and public schools (43%)
- Creating Jobs and growing the economy (31%)

Overall Direction of New Mexico

35% of New Mexico voters think the state is heading in the right direction, while 51% say the state is on the wrong track.

Of the topics polled, voters are most satisfied with how the state has handled the climate and the environment with a 63% approval rating, while 33% are dissatisfied.

Voters are most dissatisfied with public safety and public educatino, the top two areas of where they would like to see the surplus invested:

- Crime & Public Safety (75%)
- Public Education (61%)
- Water and Drought (59%)





Education

61% of voters are dissatisfied with New Mexico public education and believe we should use the budget surplus to invest in proven solutions to help our students succeed. It is critical for our existing population for attracting the workforce we need to move New Mexico ahead.

To improve education, voters believe:

- New Mexico should invest in high-quality reading and math tutoring in K-12 public schools (91%)
- Provide greater opportunities for career training and career technical education (85%)
- Require all 3rd graders to read at grade level before moving on to 4th grade, with appropriate exceptions for students with disabilities or if English is a student's second language (79%)

Voters have less support for:

- Extending the K-12 public school year by two weeks (46%)
- Reducing the number of credits required to graduate high school and eliminate some higher-level requirements such as Algebra II (32%)

Crime & Public Safety

75% of voters are unsatisfied with public safety and crime in New Mexico and believe we must continue and grow our investment in public safety.

40% of New Mexican's have witnessed shoplifting in the last twelve months.

To improve public safety, voters support:

- Increasing funding and support for mental health and substance abuse services (80%)
- Making it easier for a court to hold a suspect prior to trial (76%)
- Increasing the number of law enforcement officers in your community through more police funding (75%)

Other Top Issues

Healthcare

- 50% of voters said they were satisfied with their current access to healthcare, highlighting an opportunity for the state to partner and help expand access to healthcare across the state.
- 71% said they, or a family member, had experienced long wait times to see a primary care physician or specialist in the last year.

Housing Affordability

• 58% of voters are dissatisfied with the availability and affordability of housing in New Mexico





Economic Diversification

• 53% of voters are currently dissatisfied with the state's economic growth and diversification

This survey was conducted statewide by Strategies 360 on January 12-14, 2023, among 500 registered voters with a margin of error of $\pm 4.4\%$.
